REPORT OF THE GENERAL COUNCIL

For the Year ending 31st December, 1918.

1. The General Council desire to record the gratification with which they have learned that His Majesty the King, Patron of the Fund, has, pursuant to King Edward's Hospital Fund for London Act, 1907, appointed His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales President of the Fund. This office was held by his grandfather King Edward VII from 1897 to 1901 and by His present Majesty from 1901 to 1910, and the Fund has throughout its career largely benefited by the active assistance of its Royal Presidents. The General Council desire to express their warm appreciation of the services of the Marquess of Cambridge, Viscount Iveagh, and the Speaker of the House of Commons, who during the past nine years have, as Governors of the Fund, exercised so efficiently the powers of president.

2. The total receipts for the year 1918 were £218,679 15s. 4d., of which £12,160 2s. 7d. were contributions to Capital, and £206,519 12s. 9d. receipts on General Account.

4. The Fund, founded by His late Majesty King Edward VII, then Prince of Wales, in 1897, celebrated its coming of age in 1918 by distributing for the first time a sum of £200,000. A total of £100,000 was first reached in 1902, and £150,000 in 1909. The amount distributed in 1917 was £190,000, and in the year before the war £157,500.

5. Of the amount distributed, £190,000 was given to London Hospitals and £10,000 to Consumption Sanatoria and Convalescent Homes taking London patients, as against £181,000 and £9,000 respectively in 1917.

6. The £190,000 granted by the Fund to London Hospitals was applied as to £144,450 in aid of general maintenance, £15,800 to the reduction of debts on maintenance account, £10,100 towards improvement schemes undertaken before the war or in reduction of liabilities on such schemes, and £19,650 in aid of new schemes. Grants for maintenance amounted to £16,825 more than in 1916, or £8,075 more than in 1917.

7. Of the £10,000 distributed by the Convalescent Homes Committee, £7,825 was allocated to Consumption Sanatoria, and £2,175 to Convalescent Homes. The grants to Sanatoria enabled 64 beds to be reserved for the use of patients in London Hospitals as compared with 62 last year.

8. The total sum distributed amongst Hospitals, Convalescent Homes and Consumption Sanatoria during the last ten years (after deducting conditional grants to the extent of £2,500 that have been allowed to lapse) is £1,674,500. Since the foundation of the Fund a total amount of £2,658,416 8s. 5d. has been distributed. The average of the 22 distributions during the whole period has been £120,837 2s. 2d.

9. During the year the amount spent on the administration of the Fund was £3,672 19s. 2d., or £1 13s. 7d. per £100 of the total amount received, as compared with £3,460 10s., or £1 9s. 0½d. per £100 in the previous year. The corresponding percentage for the whole period since the inauguration of the Fund has been £1 4s. 11d., or less than 3d. in every £1 received, the average yearly outlay in this respect being £2,902 10s. 11d. The increased expenditure in 1918 has been occasioned partly by additions to salaries of the Staff, and also by the greater cost of stationery, printing, etc., caused by the War, and by the cost of the Pensions Report.

10. His Majesty the King, Patron of the Fund, has been graciously pleased to continue his annual subscription of £1,000. Her Majesty the Queen, Her Majesty Queen Alexandra, and His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales have also been pleased to subscribe to the Fund, as have also Their Royal Highnesses Prince Albert, Princess Mary, and many other Members of the Royal Family.

11. The list of contributions again includes annual subscriptions of £5,000 from Mr. Walter Morrison, £4,000 from the Drapers' Company, £1,000 from Viscount Astor, and £1,000 from the Merchant Taylors' Company. The Fund has also received annual subscriptions of £525 from Messrs. Lloyds Bank, Limited (in addition to a special donation of £525), and of £500 from Viscount Iveagh, from Sir John R. Ellerman, Bt. (in addition to a special donation of £500), from Mr. Robert Fleming, from Messrs. Morgan, Grenfell & Co., from Messrs. N. M. Rothschild & Sons, and from the family

of the late Sir S. Neumann, Bt. ; and donations of the same amount from the Clothworkers' Company, from "S.D.R.S.D," and from Messrs. John Swire & Sons, Limited ; besides an anonymous gift of £3,000 India 3½ per cent. Stock.

12. The League of Mercy this year has contributed £16,000, a sum greater by £1,000 than was received from the League last year. The total amount contributed to the Fund by the League of Mercy since its foundation in 1899 now amounts to £276,000, apart from the sums awarded by the League to institutions outside the area of the Fund's distribution. The greatest credit is due to the large number of voluntary workers who have maintained the contributions of the League of Mercy at so high a level during a period of exceptional difficulty.

13. The increased distribution was rendered possible mainly by an increase in the amount received from legacies. To maintain an annual distribution of £200,000 about £90,000 has to be raised from this source and from annual subscriptions and donations.

14. Legacies received during the year included £20,000 from the estate of the late Brigade-Surgeon John Law, on account of residue ; £6,802 8s. 10d. from the estate of the late Sir Julius Charles Wernher, Bt.; further on account of residue left to capital ; £5,254 6s. 3d. from the estate of the late Mr. N. J. Wilson Blackett, on account of residue ; £3,137 11s. 1d. from the estate of the late Mr. Alfred John Heath, being a final payment in respect of residue left to capital ; £5,000 from the estate of the late Madame L. G. Oumiross ; and £5,000 given to the Fund by the Executors of the late Mr. Thomas Stephen Whitaker, in the exercise of discretionary powers. The Fund also received £5,069 16s. 10d. under the will of the late Mr. George Herring, the proceeds of the winding-up of the Salvation Army Small Holdings Scheme, which was established by him with reversion to the Fund.

15. The Statistical Report published by the Fund on the expenditure of London Hospitals showed that the average number of beds in daily occupation by naval and military patients increased from 2,855 in 1916 to 3,656 in 1917. The total ordinary expenditure of the Hospitals had increased to £1,719,030, or £580,500 more than in 1913. This increase was partially covered by contributions from the authorities towards the treatment of naval and military patients, amounting to £268,960. The balance, amounting to £311,540, represents the additional ordinary expenditure which fell on the funds of the voluntary Hospitals of London during 1917, an increase of 27·36 per cent. on the expenditure in 1913. These large additions to the cost of maintaining the London Hospitals are a sufficient proof of the increased claim of Hospitals on the Fund and on the public.

16. The enquiry into the question of Pensions for Hospital Officers, begun by a Sub-committee of the Executive Committee in 1914, but suspended during the early part of the war, was completed in 1918. The enquiry was held at the request of the Hospital Officers

Association and with the consent of the Hospitals. The Sub-committee presented a report signed by Mr. W. J. H. Whittall, Chairman, and Mr. H. L. Hopkinson, with a dissentient memorandum signed by Sir William Collins. The Sub-committee are agreed that, except at a few larger hospitals which have schemes, there is great uncertainty and lack of uniformity in dealing with pensions to retiring officers, that these and other serious defects are detrimental both to the officers and to the hospitals, and that they can only be effectually remedied by a general scheme covering the whole of the hospital service.

After a survey of existing methods of providing pensions in various other services, the report lays down the general principles which should be observed in any scheme for hospital officers. These include financial provision in advance by contributions from the hospitals and the officers, and the full maintenance of pension rights in the event of migration from one hospital to another within the scheme.

On the question of the best method of obtaining the desired conditions the Sub-committee are not unanimous, and the Executive Committee, after considering the reports, passed the following resolutions :—

- (1) That this Report, with the Dissentient Memorandum and appendices, be published for the consideration of the parties concerned.*
- (2) That the Committee cannot recommend to the Governors and General Council that King Edward's Hospital Fund should, in respect of its general funds, give any guarantee in aid of any pension scheme.

The Council are greatly indebted to the three members of the Executive Committee who carried out this enquiry, and commend the report to the consideration of the Hospitals.

17. Every eligible Hospital which applied for a grant was inspected and reported upon, as hitherto, by two of the Fund's visitors, one medical and the other lay. Several lady visitors were for the first time appointed. The inspection of Consumption Sanatoria was again prevented by the restrictions on travelling. All the Sanatoria receiving grants had, however, already been visited for several successive years.

18. At the beginning of 1918 the Ministry of Food were desirous of obtaining the services of Mr. H. R. Maynard, and the Fund readily agreed, with his concurrence, to an arrangement by which his time was divided between the Ministry and the Fund. This arrangement is still in force, and has thrown a heavy burden on him and on the other members of the Staff. The Council desire to acknowledge the conscientious manner in which the work of the Fund has been carried on by all concerned.

19. The Council regret to record the death of Dr. Freshfield, Chairman of the Convalescent Homes Committee since 1915. Dr. Freshfield had been a Member of the Committee since

1898 and of the Council since 1905, and had also rendered great services as head of the firm of Messrs. Freshfields, Honorary Solicitors to the Fund since its foundation.

The Council have also to regret the retirement of Sir William Church from the Distribution Committee, of which he had been Chairman for sixteen years. The Council are deeply grateful for his great services during this period and trust that he may long be able to continue his connection with the Fund as a Member of the Council.

Sir John Tweedy has been appointed Chairman of the Distribution Committee, and Sir William Bennett of the Convalescent Homes Committee.

The Council regret that Mr. Walter Morrison has been unable to continue his Membership of the Council.

20. The President of the Local Government Board, in pursuance of his powers under the Act, has again appointed Messrs. Deloitte, Plender, Griffiths & Co., Chartered Accountants, to audit the accounts of the Fund for the year. They have been the Honorary Auditors since January, 1898, during which period they have rendered the Fund very valuable service.

21. The Council are under great obligations to the Press for the assistance they have rendered in the past, and continue to rely upon their kindly co-operation in obtaining for the Fund wider publicity and support.

Distribution Meeting of Governors and General Council.

A Meeting of the Governors and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, for the purpose of awarding grants to the Hospitals, Convalescent Homes and Consumption Sanatoria for the present year, was held on Tuesday morning, December 17, 1918, at St. James's Palace, the Marquis of Cambridge being in the chair.

Those present were : The Viscount Iveagh, The Rt. Hon. James W. Lowther (Speaker of the House of Commons), the Bishop of London, the Rev. A. E. Garvie, D.D., the Chief Rabbi (the Rev. J. H. Hertz, D.D.), the Earl of Bessborough, the Viscount Knutsford, the Viscount Mersey, the Viscount Farquhar, Lord Revelstoke, Lord Burnham, Lord Stamfordham, Lord Somerleyton (Honorary Secretary), Lord Stuart of Wortley, the Rt. Hon. the Lord Mayor (President of the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds), the Chairman of the County Council (Mr. R. C. Norman), the President of the Royal College of Physicians (Dr. Norman Moore), the President of the Royal College of Surgeons (Major-Gen. Sir George Makins), the Rt. Hon. Sir T. Vezey Strong, Sir William S. Church, Bt., Sir Walter Lawrence, Bt., Sir Henry Burdett, Sir William H. Bennett, Sir William J. Collins, Sir Cooper Perry, Sir John Craggs, Sir John Tweedy, Mr. Frederick M. Fry (Honorary Secretary), Mr. John G. Griffiths (Honorary Secretary), Mr. Yvon R. Eccles.

Lord SOMERLEYTON (Honorary Secretary) read the Minutes of the last Meeting, which were confirmed, and reported letters of regret from the following :—

The Lord Lieutenant of the County of London (the Marquess of Crewe, K.G.), the Bishop of Southwark, the Rev. W. L. Watkinson, D.D., the Hon. N. Charles Rothschild, The President of the Local Government Board (The Rt. Hon. Sir Auckland Geddes), the Governor of the Bank of England (Sir Brien Cokayne), the Right Hon. Thomas Burt, Sir Francis H. Champneys, Bt., Sir Owen Philipps, Sir Everard Hambro, Mr. Robert Fleming, Mr. Geo. Lawson Johnston, Mr. W. J. H. Whittall.

Lord REVELSTOKE (the Honorary Treasurer) said that he had pleasure in stating that the total receipts on general fund to December 7, after deducting expenses, amounted to £174,531. The total receipts for the year, exclusive of the contribution from the League of Mercy, to which reference would duly be made later on by Sir William Collins, were however, estimated to amount to £178,271. While these were the receipts for the year, he was able to report that the Fund had with its Bankers or at short call, sufficient cash to meet the whole of the sum which it had been decided to distribute for the year 1918, amounting in all to £200,000.

Sir WILLIAM COLLINS, in making the annual statement on behalf of the League of Mercy, reminded the Council that in the last complete pre-war year the contribution from the League to the Fund was £14,000 ; in 1914 and 1915 the same amount ; in 1916 and 1917 £15,000. He was glad to be able to say that the League would be able this year to present £16,000. That would make a total contribution, during the five years of war, of £74,000, as against £14,000 in the last pre-war year, and an average of £13,500 in all the pre-war years. The League had been in existence for just twenty

years; during that period it would have contributed, with the amount announced this day, £276,000 to King Edward's Fund, and to the extra-metropolitan hospitals in the area of its collection outside the area of distribution of the King's Fund, £29,280; making for the twenty years a total contribution from the League of Mercy to the Voluntary Hospitals in and around London of £305,280.

Sir WILLIAM CHURCH (the Chairman of the Distribution Committee) presented the Report of that Committee.

Mr. FREDERICK M. FRY (Hon. Secretary) presented the list of awards.

Sir WILLIAM BENNETT (the Chairman of the Convalescent Homes Committee) presented the Report of that Committee.

Mr. JOHN G. GRIFFITHS (Hon. Secretary) presented the list of awards.

The Marquess of CAMBRIDGE, in moving the adoption of the Reports and Awards, said:—

My Lords and Gentlemen,—Before moving the adoption of the Reports I have the honour to read the following message which His Majesty the King, Patron of the Fund, has been graciously pleased to send through Lord Stamfordham:—

“ Buckingham Palace,
“ December 16, 1918.

“ DEAR SIR,

“ I am commanded by the King, on this the coming of age of the Fund which bears his father's name and was founded by his late Majesty in 1897, to convey to the Governors and General Council his hearty congratulations on the success which has been achieved towards the fulfilment of the intentions and hopes of its founder.

“ The fact also that the Fund is able this year for the first time to distribute £200,000 among the Hospitals and Convalescent Homes of London is a happy coincidence, and will be regarded by all those who have been impressed by the work of the Hospitals, both in war and in peace time, as a landmark in the history of the Fund.

“ His Majesty is much gratified by the support which the Fund receives from the public, and, while deeply grateful for the large contributions both in annual subscriptions and gifts to capital from munificent donors, he values very highly the sum derived from those who generously give out of their small incomes, either directly or through the League of Mercy.

“ The King notes with satisfaction that the Fund is setting aside grants for improvements which have had to be deferred till after the war, and that the report on Pension Schemes for Hospital Officers, drawn up under the able guidance of Mr. Whittall, is now completed.

“ His Majesty knows that the Governors and General Council will join with him in deplored the death of the Chairman of the Convalescent Homes Committee, Dr. Freshfield, who had been connected with the Fund since its foundation.

“ His Majesty learns with the utmost regret of the approaching retirement of Sir William Church from the Distribution Committee. The important and onerous work of this Committee has contributed largely to the success of the Fund, and the King feels that we owe a debt of gratitude to Sir William Church for the invaluable services which he has rendered as Chairman of the Committee. His Majesty trusts that he may long remain a Member of the General Council.

"It is the earnest hope of the King that the Prince of Wales may be able shortly to take up the Presidency of the Fund, the duties of which, during the minority of the Prince and his absence on service abroad, have been so ably performed by the three Governors.

"His Majesty tenders his sincere thanks to all the Members of the Council and Committees, especially to those who have carried out the exacting duties of Chairmen and Secretaries.

"King Edward's Hospital Fund for London."

The Fund has come of age since the last Distribution Meeting of the Council. For it was on February 5, 1897, that his late Majesty King Edward, then Prince of Wales, signed the letter to the public by which it was inaugurated. In that letter £100,000 to £150,000 a year was mentioned as a goal at which to aim. This year the distribution reaches for the first time the sum of £200,000. Of this large sum, more than £190,000 has been provided by the current income of the Fund. This includes the receipts from invested funds, which, under the care of the Finance Committee, come in with unfailing regularity even in these difficult times. It also includes legacies, which vary greatly from year to year, and of which the average rather than the receipts for the year is usually taken into account. For the greater part of the balance we are indebted to subscribers and donors, including the numerous contributors to the League of Mercy, the organisers of which deserve a special word of thanks for their splendid efforts throughout the war. The most important individual contributions received during the year have been Mr. Walter Morrison's annual subscription of £5,000; £20,000 received in War Bonds on account of the residue of the estate of the late Brigade Surgeon John Law; and £5,254 residue left by the late Mr. N. J. Wilson Blackett. Amongst special contributions to meet the exceptional demands due to the war we have received an additional £800 from Lloyds Bank, and £500 from Messrs. John Swire & Son, while Sir John Ellerman has for this year doubled his usual war gift of £500. But even after taking all these into account we shall probably be obliged, in order to make up the total of £200,000, to draw about £6,000 from the reserve fund created by the legacy of the late Isabella, Countess of Wilton and the balance of the gift received last year from Viscount Astor. That the needs of the Hospitals justify us in making this effort is shown by the figures in the Fund's Statistical Report. After allowing for payments received towards the treatment of the wounded, the ordinary expenditure falling on the normal sources of Hospital revenue in 1917 increased, as compared with 1913, by £311,000. The increase in the grants made by this fund towards maintenance during the same period has been £45,000. The needs of the Hospitals in the immediate future are not likely to diminish. Many beds at present occupied by wounded and partly paid for by the Military Authorities will be restored to civilian use, and will have to be wholly maintained out of normal sources of income. Renewals and repairs have at many Hospitals been necessarily deferred and will be a cause of heavy expense. Urgent improvements have also been postponed and extensions are in some cases overdue. The Fund has already set aside several grants for improvements and more will be required. On the subject of Hospital extensions, the Distribution Committee include in their report some rather striking figures. Until recently, the Fund had discouraged the issue of appeals for post-war building schemes. It was not thought desirable that money should be collected during the war for objects which were not of immediate urgency,

and which it might never be possible to carry out. Latterly, however, the Fund has modified its policy by approving the issue of appeals, provided that the terms of the appeal were such that the money collected could be applied to endowment, if it could not all be prudently expended on building. The Committee point out in their Report that, if all the schemes which have come to their notice were to be carried out, the number of beds in London Hospitals would be increased, as compared with 1913, by at least 1,750. This is a large number, and there may yet be more, since the enlargement of Hospitals is often the best form of War Memorial, and new ideas of public health are continually increasing the demands on their accommodation. The Distribution Committee are therefore inviting all the Hospitals concerned to let the Fund know how their schemes stand at present, and what their views are as to the future. It is one of the advantages of a Central Fund like this that it can form a sort of clearing house for ideas in such matters, and can use its influence to co-ordinate the separate efforts of the Hospitals. There is, for instance, the question of finance, both for building and for maintenance. Each Hospital that contemplates an extension may make a perfectly satisfactory estimate of its own future resources. But the combined total for all the Hospitals may be so great as to endanger the success of each separate scheme. There is also the question of geographical distribution. To re-arrange the present Hospital accommodation would be a gigantic task. But the extensions of existing Hospitals can be so distributed as to reduce, as far as possible, the worst inequalities. This, no doubt, is aimed at by each separate scheme; but without a comprehensive knowledge of the general needs, and of all the remedies proposed, the different schemes may sometimes overlap. In these and other ways the friendly co-operation of King Edward's Hospital Fund may be of the greatest assistance. A remedy for one particular instance of faulty hospital distribution is mentioned in the Distribution Committee's report. Nine years ago the Committee suggested that a representative movement should be started in Woolwich to provide a general Hospital of fair size, and the Council agreed to make an exception to its general rule against making grants to new Hospitals. This year we have pleasure in setting aside the sum of £5,000 as a first contribution towards the Woolwich and District War Memorial Hospital building scheme. The report on Pensions for Hospital Officers, on which a Sub-Committee, under the Chairmanship of the well-known actuary, Mr. W. J. H. Whittall, has been engaged for some time, is on the point of being published by the Executive Committee. The enquiry was undertaken at the request of the Hospital Officers' Association. The Sub-Committee agree that the officers' case is broadly speaking made out, and that a satisfactory remedy can only be found in a general scheme. In order to ascertain what the fundamental features of a general scheme should be, they make a survey of various methods of providing pensions already in operation in other services, and the information thus collected and commented on by the Sub-Committee should prove of the greatest interest and assistance to all who are concerned with pensions schemes. In the light of the past experience of pension schemes, they submit recommendations, though not in all important points unanimously, as to the general lines of a pension scheme for Hospital Officers, and as to the best method of securing the desired end. This is the first year in which the Convalescent Homes Committee have distributed as much as £10,000, and the number of beds which the Committee secure for the use of patients in London Hospitals is now 64, whereas in 1913 it was 44. The Fund has lost one of its oldest members and helpers by the death of Dr. Freshfield, Chairman of the Convalescent Homes Committee, and head of the firm which has acted as Honorary Solicitors to the Fund since its foundation. The Council will be sorry to hear that this is the last occasion on which the report of the Distribution Committee will be presented by Sir William Church, whose resignation from the Committee has been received and accepted with regret

by the Governors. Sir William has been Chairman of the Committee since 1903, during which time that part of the annual distribution which is given to Hospitals has increased from £99,000 to £190,000, and the work of the Committee has grown in several ways. We hope Sir William will long remain a Member of the General Council, and thus continue to the Fund the support of his name and his experience. The Governors intend to invite Sir John Tweedy to succeed him as Chairman of the Distribution Committee. I have now to express the thanks of the Governors to the Members of the Council and Members of Committees, as well as to the visitors and the Honorary Officers of the Fund, for their work during the past year. I now beg to move the adoption of the Reports.

The Lord Mayor (Sir HORACE MARSHALL) having seconded the motion, the adoption of the Reports was put and carried unanimously.

On the motion of the Chief Rabbi (The Rev. J. H. HERTZ, D.D.), seconded by Sir HENRY BURDETT, it was resolved that the cheques for the grants should be posted on Friday, December 20, except in the case of grants for the reservation of beds in Consumption Sanatoria during 1919, the cheques for which should be posted on January 1.

In the absence of the Earl of Bessborough (Chairman of the Executive Committee), Lord SOMERLEYTON (Hon. Secretary) moved the adoption of a further interim Report of the Committee on the subject of rules and regulations.

The motion was seconded by Sir T. VEZEY STRONG, and carried unanimously.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR 1919.

The Marquess of CAMBRIDGE then said :—

My Lords and Gentlemen,—I have now to ask one of the Honorary Secretaries to read the list of Members of the General Council, Members of Committees and Officers whom the Governors intend to appoint for next year. After this it will be necessary to approve the delegation resolutions which will be laid before the formal meeting in the new year. In the list of Members the Council will miss two familiar names. Mr. Walter Morrison was unable to accept nomination to the Council for 1918 and Mr. Whittall is prevented by ill-health from continuing his services on the Executive Committee, where his work on the Pensions Report has been so arduous and so valuable.

The list having been read,

There was moved by Lord STAMFORDHAM, seconded by Sir JOHN CRAGGS, and approved, a Resolution delegating powers to the Finance Committee, Distribution Committee and Convalescent Homes Committee.

On the motion of the Chairman of the London County Council (Mr. R. C. NORMAN), seconded by the President of the Royal College of Physicians (Dr. NORMAN MOORE), a Resolution was approved delegating further powers to the Finance Committee.

On the motion of the President of the Royal College of Surgeons (Sir GEORGE MAKINS), seconded by Lord FARQUHAR, a Resolution was approved delegating powers to the Executive Committee.

The Bishop of LONDON, in proposing a vote of thanks to the Marquess of Cambridge for presiding, said his Lordship had always taken the deepest interest in Hospitals and the working of King Edward's Fund.

The resolution was seconded by the Rev. Dr. A. E. GARVIE, and carried unanimously.

The MARQUESS OF CAMBRIDGE having briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, the proceedings terminated.

Annual Meeting of President and General Council.

The Annual Meeting of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, to receive the Accounts and the Report for the year 1918, was held at St. James's Palace on Tuesday, 6th May, 1919, H.R.H. the Prince of Wales, President of the Fund, being in the chair.

Champneys, Bt., Lt.-General Sir Alfred Keogh, Sir Owen Philipps, M.P., Sir Henry Burdett, Sir William J. Collins, Sir Cooper Perry, Sir John Craggs, Sir John Tweedy, Mr. Frederick M. Fry (Hon. Secretary), Mr. John G. Griffiths (Hon. Secretary), Mr. Yvon R. Eccles, Mr. Geo. Lawson Johnston.

* Lord SOMERLEYTON (Honorary Secretary) read the Minutes of the last Meeting, which were confirmed, and reported letters of regret from the following:—The Lord-Lieutenant of the County of London (The Marquess of Crewe), The Bishop of London, The Bishop of Southwark, Cardinal Bourne, The Rev. A. E. Garvie, D.D., The Chief Rabbi (the Rev. J. H. Hertz, D.D.), The Earl of Bessborough, The Viscount Iveagh, Lord Murray of Elibank, The Hon. N. Charles Rothschild, The Postmaster-General (The Rt. Hon. Albert Illingworth, M.P.), The President of the Local Government Board (The Rt. Hon. Christopher Addison, M.D., M.P.), The Governor of the Bank of England (Sir Brien Cokayne), The Rt. Hon. Thomas Burt, Sir Walter Lawrence, Bt., Sir William H. Bennett, Sir Everard Hambro, Mr. Robert Fleming, Mr. W. J. H. Whittall.

Lord REVELSTOKE (the Honorary Treasurer) in presenting the Account of Receipts and Expenditure and the Balance Sheet for the year ending 31st December, 1918, said that the Council might remember that when it was decided last autumn to increase the distribution from £190,000 to £200,000, the estimated income for the year, after allowing for expenses, fell short of that sum by about £6,000. During the last fortnight of December, however, they received an unexpected legacy, with the result that instead of a deficit there was a surplus of nearly £3,000. With regard to the investments of the Corporation, the position might be regarded as satisfactory. The market value of the investments of the Fund at the end of 1918, as compared with the valuation made in 1908 upon the passing of the Act of Incorporation, showed a net depreciation of 10.72 per cent., after allowing for appreciation and depreciation realised since the year 1908. He might add that more than 63 per cent. of the invested funds were in the form of British Government Securities.

The PRINCE OF WALES formally moved the adoption of the Accounts.

The resolution having been seconded by the Lord Mayor (Sir HORACE MARSHALL), was then put and carried unanimously.

Mr. FREDERICK M. FRY (Hon. Secretary) presented the draft Report of the Council for year 1918.

The PRINCE OF WALES, who on rising to move the adoption of the Report was warmly received, said :—

My Lords and Gentlemen,—It is with a deep sense of responsibility that I have accepted the duties, laid upon me by command of His Majesty the King, of President of this great Fund. I would remind you that it was founded twenty-two years ago by my grandfather, King Edward VII, who was its President for four years; my father was President for nine years, and on his accession became its Patron. I count it a great honour to be called upon to carry on their work, a work dear to them both and which has proved so beneficial to the Hospitals of London. Under their continuous personal supervision the Fund secured that position in the confidence of the public which it still holds. By the time that King Edward ceased to be President and became Patron the annual distribution had risen to £50,000, and when my father ceased to be President it had reached £150,000. The constitution, the methods, and the traditions which they established have stood the test of time, and it will be my earnest endeavour, as your President, to adopt and to develop the principles which they have so well laid down. His Majesty desires me to express his thanks, to which I wish to add my own, to Lord Cambridge, Lord Iveagh, and the Speaker of the House of Commons, who, as Governors of the Fund, have so ably carried out the duties of President since 1910, during my minority and also during my absence on active service overseas. My first act was to appoint them Members of the General Council, and I hope the Fund may long continue to have the benefit of their experience. It is gratifying to know that the finances of the Fund are in such a satisfactory condition in spite of the exceptional difficulties of the present time. The distribution last year reached for the first time the sum of £200,000, and the whole of this was provided out of the receipts for the year. We are greatly indebted to Lord Revelstoke and the Finance Committee for the care and success with which they have managed the investments. (Hear, hear.) The income from these investments is the solid foundation for what I hope may prove an ever-increasing distribution. But in order merely to maintain the latter at its present level we must rely on the public for about £90,000 from Annual Subscriptions, Donations, and Legacies, and any increase in the distribution must therefore depend on the increased receipts from these sources. That the money is well spent is shown by the figures quoted in the annual report. In addition to their work for civilian patients, the Hospitals of London had, on the average, 3,656 beds occupied by sailors and soldiers in the year 1917. Their expenditure in 1917, after allowing for the payments from the Admiralty and the War Office, was £300,000 more than in 1913, and over and above this they will now have to face the cost of repairs, of renewals, and of improvements that have been necessarily postponed during the war. They will therefore need all the help that King Edward's Hospital Fund can give. The Report on Pensions for Hospital Officers, prepared by a Sub-Committee of the Executive Committee, is an important addition to the Fund's list of publications on Hospital matters. It is full of information about Hospital pensions as they are now and as the Sub-Committee consider they should be, and about pension schemes generally, much of which is likely to be of interest to all who are concerned with pension problems. The Sub-Committee were convinced that at the great majority of Hospitals the existing provision for pensions was seriously defective, and that a satisfactory general scheme would not only prevent hardship to individuals, but would raise the status and increase the efficiency of the whole service, and, by so doing, would benefit the Hospitals themselves in their work for the sick poor. An adequate pensions scheme is thus recognised as a legitimate and even a profitable branch of Hospital expenditure, and from this point of view the conclusions of the Report may appeal to donors who are specially interested

in the efficient organisation of the Hospital service of London. Our best thanks are due to the members of the Sub-Committee, and particularly to the Chairman, Mr. Whittall, who has devoted a very great amount of expert labour to the inquiry and the preparation of the Report. To all who have so generously given their services or other support to King Edward's Hospital Fund I tender my hearty acknowledgments and grateful thanks. I now move the adoption of the Annual Report of the Council for the year 1918.

The MARQUESS OF CAMBRIDGE having seconded the resolution, the adoption of the Report was then put and carried unanimously.

The SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS, in moving a vote of thanks to H.R.H. the Prince of Wales for presiding, said :—

My Lords and Gentlemen,—I am sure that I shall be voicing the views of everybody here present to-day if I ask you to pass a hearty vote of thanks to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales for having taken the chair. I am sure also that you will desire to congratulate him upon his return from the Front safe and sound after all the experiences which he has gone through, and upon the promptitude and readiness with which he has at once taken up the onerous duties awaiting him here at home. Amongst those duties, though not amongst the most onerous, is that of being President of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London. He was kind enough to refer to the services which have been rendered by Lord Cambridge, Lord Iveagh, and myself during the time of his minority and during his absence abroad. Speaking for myself, and I am sure on behalf of my two colleagues, I can only say that it has been a labour of love, and that we have been very pleased to render all the services that we could during His Royal Highness's absence. I will not say anything further on this occasion, but on behalf of the Council express our very great pleasure at seeing His Royal Highness amongst us, and the hope that during the years that he presides over us the advance in the utility of the Fund may be as rapid and as great as that which took place during the time that his father, His Most Gracious Majesty, occupied the chair which he now occupies. I have much pleasure in proposing a hearty vote of thanks to His Royal Highness for presiding to-day.

Sir ALFRED KEOGH, in seconding the resolution, said he was sure they would all desire to associate themselves with the remarks of the Speaker. It was unfortunately true that the cost of the maintenance of sailors and soldiers in the London Hospitals during the War had thrown a great burden on the Fund, but he had no doubt that in the work of the coming years the active association with the Fund of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales would be of inestimable value.

The resolution was then put and carried by acclamation.

His ROYAL HIGHNESS said :—

My Lords and Gentlemen,—I thank you very sincerely for the kind way in which you have passed this vote of thanks. It is a very great pleasure to me now to take over my duties as President of this Fund, and to have the advantage of the help of so many distinguished people who have been working at it so hard and for such a long time.

The proceedings then terminated.

Report of the Distribution Committee.

(1) The Governors and General Council have this year fixed the sum available for distribution amongst the London Hospitals at £190,000, as against £181,000 in 1917, £162,500 in 1916, and £149,500 in 1913, the last year before the war.

(2) The number of Hospitals applying for grants is 106.

(3) Of the total amount distributed, £160,250 has been applied in the form of grants to maintenance. This is an increase of £8,075 over the corresponding total in 1917, and of £16,825 over that of 1916.

(4) The capital grants this year amount to £29,750, an increase of £925 as compared with 1917, and of £10,675 as compared with 1916. Of this year's total, only £4,150 is in respect of schemes sanctioned during the war on the ground of exceptional urgency, while £10,100 is in reduction of capital liabilities incurred before the war. The remaining £15,500 has been earmarked for schemes of improvement, the execution of which had been deferred until after the war.

(5) During the course of the war a large number of Hospitals have prepared schemes of improvement or extension to be carried out after the return of peace, and have submitted their proposals either in principle or in detail to the Fund. During the first three years of the war the Distribution Committee, with the approval of the General Council, discouraged the issue of all public appeals in aid of schemes which were not of such urgency as to require their being put in hand at once. Their reasons for this were :

- (a) that it was undesirable that appeals for future objects should compete with appeals for purposes which were urgently necessary during the period of national stress ;
- (b) that it was undesirable to accumulate funds earmarked for future building when it was impossible to foresee the circumstances which would obtain after the war.

At the Distribution of 1917, however, the Committee for the first time recommended some capital grants in aid of the most urgent of the deferred schemes ; and they have continued the same policy this year.

In April, 1918, they announced their readiness to consider proposals for the immediate issue of appeals for post-war schemes, on certain conditions, one of which was:

"that wherever the carrying out of the scheme would involve increased maintenance expenditure it should be clearly stated in the appeal that contributions received in response thereto should be available either for building, or for endowment in the event of circumstances rendering it inadvisable to expend the whole of the contributions on building."

(6) The importance of ensuring, by some such means as this, that neither the Fund nor the individual Hospitals are committed in advance to extensions on any fixed scale is shown by the fact that, if all the schemes which have come to the notice of the Fund were to be completed, the number of beds to be maintained by the Voluntary Hospitals of London would be increased, as compared with those maintained in 1913, by not less than 1,750.

The Committee at the present stage do not desire to express any opinion as to whether this number of additional beds is or is not required. Some of the schemes have been launched without the views of the Fund having been sought. But in order to be in a position to consider the whole question from the point of view of the total needs of the population, the geographical distribution of the proposed increases, and the financial problem of future maintenance, the Committee have decided to invite all the Hospitals concerned to furnish them with the latest particulars of their building schemes, whether previously submitted in detail to the Fund or not.

In the meantime they have not considered at this year's distribution any applications for grants in aid of the provision of additional beds, except in the special case mentioned in the next paragraph.

(7) The Committee include in their awards this year a special grant of £5,000 towards the Woolwich and District War Memorial Hospital Building Fund.

It is not the practice of the Fund to assist in the building of new Hospitals or to entertain applications from Hospitals which have not been in existence in a properly constituted form for a period of three years. In 1909, however, the Distribution Committee announced their desire to see a representative movement started in Woolwich for the provision of an efficient General Hospital of fair size, and stated that in consideration of the special local circumstances they would be prepared to recommend the General Council to support such a movement by a modification in this instance of the rule as to new Hospitals, so as to allow of a conditional building grant.

The proposed War Memorial Hospital in Woolwich is the outcome of such a representative movement, and the Distribution Committee recommend that a grant of £5,000 should be made this year as a first contribution towards the erection of a new Hospital in accordance with a scheme to be submitted to the Fund in due course.

(8) The Committee have pleasure in reporting the receipt of proposals for the amalgamation of University College Hospital with the Royal Ear Hospital, whereby the latter, which has been closed during the war, will be re-opened as a special department of the former. The Committee

recommend that the balance of £500 remaining unallocated out of the £10,500 set aside for the amalgamation of Throat Hospitals should be given to this scheme, and that a further grant of £500 be made to the same object out of this year's distribution.

By this amalgamation, following on that of the Hospital for Diseases of the Throat, Golden Square, with the London Throat Hospital, the number of Ear, Nose, and Throat Hospitals which formerly applied to the Fund will be reduced from five to three, of which only two are now on the books of the Fund, and the Committee do not now ask for any powers in respect of the sums conditionally promised for further amalgamations.

(9) The Committee have as usual taken into consideration the returns made by the Hospitals relating to the treatment of naval and military patients during the previous year, and also during the first nine months of the current year.

(10) The following grants in aid of schemes of building expenditure which have been deferred during the war are recommended for renewal :—

Victoria Hospital (1916), £200 to heating.

Hospital and Home for Sick Children, Sydenham (1915), £75 to central heating.

Queen Charlotte's Lying-in Hospital (1913), £1,000 to new out-patient department.

St. Mary's Hospital for Women and Children, Plaistow (1913), £1,500 to new nurses' home and out-patient department.

(11) In dealing with questions of cost per bed the Committee have, as before, given full weight to the inevitable increases of cost which result from the rise in prices and in wages, the difficulty of obtaining skilled service, and other causes common to all Hospitals, and have only taken into account cases where the cost is high in comparison with other Hospitals or where there has been a disproportionate rise.

(12) The Committee are again greatly indebted to the Visitors for their very valuable Reports. The services of the Visitors are the more appreciated at the present time because of the difficulty under which the work of inspection is carried on by medical men and laymen who are already fully occupied by extra duties arising out of the war.

(13) The details of the awards to the various Hospitals are appended.

Report of the Convalescent Homes Committee.

(1) The Governors and General Council have this year fixed the sum available for distribution amongst Convalescent Homes and Consumption Sanatoria at £10,000, as against £9,000 in 1917. This is an increase of £1,000 on the largest sum ever before placed at the disposal of the Convalescent Homes Committee.

(2) The number of applications eligible for consideration amounted to 45 from Convalescent Homes and 9 from Consumption Sanatoria, as against 41 and 9 respectively last year.

(3) In dealing with all applications, whether from Sanatoria or from Convalescent Homes, the Committee have, as usual, taken into consideration the question of comparative urgency of need, as shown by the audited accounts and balance sheets of the various institutions to December 31st last. In the case of Consumption Sanatoria they have also taken note of the proportion of the total work of each institution which is covered by the receipts under the National Insurance Act. As these and other circumstances affecting the relative claims of the different institutions vary from year to year, it must not be assumed that a reduction in the grant to any particular institution, whether for maintenance or for capital purposes, or even the absence of a grant, implies dissatisfaction.

(4) The proportion allotted to Convalescent Homes is again smaller than usual owing to the absence of grants to several Homes which since the beginning of the war have ceased to be occupied by convalescent patients from London, and which are therefore temporarily ineligible for consideration by this Committee.

(5) The increased amount available for distribution has assisted the Committee to meet the increased demands on the Fund due to the unavoidable rise in the cost of maintenance of beds at Sanatoria, and has also enabled them to obtain two additional beds for the use of

patients in London hospitals. The accommodation secured this year amounts to 64 beds at six Sanatoria, situated as follows:—

- 10 beds for children at the Children's Sanatorium, Holt, Norfolk.
- 4 beds at the Daneswood Sanatorium (Jewish), Woburn Sands, Beds.
- 10 beds at the Devon and Cornwall Sanatorium, South Brent, Devon.
- 6 beds at the Kelling Sanatorium, Holt, Norfolk.
- 22 beds at the Sanatorium of the National Association for the Establishment and Maintenance of Sanatoria for Workers, Benenden, Kent.
- 12 beds at the Northamptonshire Sanatorium, Creaton, Northants.

(6) The Committee recommend that the beds thus reserved be allocated amongst London hospitals as follows:—

- 12 beds to the City of London Hospital for Diseases of the Chest.
- 2 beds to the Royal Hospital for Diseases of the Chest.
- 11 beds to the London Hospital.
- 10 beds to Guy's Hospital.
- 6 beds to the Middlesex Hospital.
- 5 beds to St. Thomas's Hospital.
- 4 beds to St. George's Hospital.
- 4 beds to University College Hospital.
- 2 beds to Charing Cross Hospital.
- 2 beds to King's College Hospital.
- 2 beds to the Royal Free Hospital.
- 2 beds to St. Mary's Hospital.
- 2 beds to Westminster Hospital.

(7) Owing to the continued restrictions on travelling facilities, both by rail and by motor, it has again been found impracticable to arrange for the inspection of Consumption Sanatoria in the country. All the Sanatoria to which grants are recommended had, previous to 1917, been inspected by the Fund's Visitors for several successive years.

(8) The grants recommended to the various institutions are appended.

TITLE AND CONSTITUTION.

The Fund was founded in 1897, under the title of "The Prince of Wales's Hospital Fund for London," by his late Majesty King Edward VII., then Prince of Wales, with the object of securing more efficient aid and support for the Hospitals of London, and of thus commemorating the Sixtieth Anniversary of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, by establishing the voluntary hospital system of London on a sound financial basis.

It was re-named "King Edward's Hospital Fund for London" in January 1902, after the accession of His Majesty King Edward VII.

By desire of King Edward, it was incorporated under that title, and its constitution settled, by King Edward's Hospital Fund for London Act, 1907 (7 Edw. 7, Ch. lxx.).

The Governing Body under the Act consists of the President and General Council.

His late Majesty King Edward VII. was President of the Fund, while Prince of Wales, from 1897 to 1901, and was subsequently its Patron during his reign from 1901 to 1910.

His present Majesty King George V. was President, as Prince of Wales, from 1901 to 1910, and is now Patron.

On April 18, 1919, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales was appointed President of the Fund.

From June 1910 to April 1919 the powers of the President were exercised by three Governors appointed by His Majesty pursuant to the provisions of the Act, the Right Hon. James W. Lowther, Speaker of the House of Commons, the Marquess of Cambridge, and Viscount Iveagh.

The work of the Fund is carried on under the General Council by the four standing Committees and the Officers as set out on pages 1 and 2. No individual serves on more than one Committee.

RULES AS TO APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS.

Under its present rules the Fund receives applications for grants from :

- (a) Hospitals situated in the County of London or within 9 miles from Charing Cross.
- (b) Convalescent Homes which are situated within these boundaries, or which, being situated outside, take a large proportion of patients from London.
- (c) Consumption Sanatoria which take patients from London, or which are prepared to place beds at the disposal of the Fund for the use of patients from London Hospitals.

The Fund does not, however, assist at present in the foundation of new institutions, or entertain applications from institutions which have not been in existence in a properly constituted form for a period of at least three years, or from dispensaries, nursing institutes, or other institutions not possessing beds for in-patients, or from institutions for the treatment of incurables or of mental cases, or from holiday homes as distinct from convalescent homes.

All institutions applying for grants are required to publish their accounts in accordance with the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts (see page 65).

Every eligible Hospital and Sanatorium applying for a grant is annually inspected on behalf of the Fund by two Visitors, a medical man and a layman in each case, specially appointed for the purpose (see page 2).

In accordance with the rule laid down by the Founder of the Fund, in order that the hospitals should derive the greatest possible amount of assistance, the Fund does not receive "letters" of admission or recommendation in return for its grants.

Applications are invited in March, and the awards are made, on the recommendations of the Distribution and Convalescent Homes Committees, by the General Council in December.

Applications for grants, and all other communications, should be addressed to the Honorary Secretaries, at 7 Walbrook, E.C. 4.

METHODS AND RESULTS.

Under the active personal supervision of its Royal Presidents, the Fund has grown steadily in the scope of its work and has secured in an increasing degree the confidence and support of the public.

During the twenty-two years of its existence the Fund has distributed over £2,658,416 to London Hospitals and to Consumption Sanatoria and Convalescent Homes taking London patients, the amount distributed in 1918 being £200,000, an increase of £10,000 over the previous year, and £42,500 over the previous maximum in the years preceding the war.

The amount spent annually on administration since the foundation of the Fund has averaged £1 4s. 11d. per cent. of the receipts, which is equal to less than 3d. in every £1 received.

The League of Mercy, founded under Royal Charter in 1899, has enlisted the co-operation of thousands of small subscribers, and has contributed £276,000 to the Fund during the last twenty years ; the contribution in 1918 being £16,000, £1,000 more than in 1917.

The Fund has through its Committees, and through the annual inspections by its Visitors, special facilities for ascertaining the relative needs, efficiency and economy of working of the various institutions and any special circumstances affecting their claims ; and it allocates its grants accordingly. Extracts from the Visitors' Reports, together with other remarks bearing on efficiency or economy, are communicated privately to the hospitals with the grants.

All important schemes of building, extension or improvement of hospitals are submitted to the Fund and carefully scrutinised ; and, in suitable cases, special grants are made. An examination is now being made of all schemes of importance deferred during the war, especially those which involve any increase in the number of beds.

In co-operation with the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds, a Uniform System of Hospital Accounts has been introduced which facilitates comparisons between the financial positions of the various Hospitals ; and due economy is encouraged by the publication of an Annual Statistical Report showing the cost of working at different hospitals (see page 65). The issue of these Reports has enabled the Hospitals to effect considerable savings.

From the foregoing it will be seen that the Fund not only collects money for the voluntary hospitals but also helps to secure that all contributions given to them are efficiently and economically employed.

PUBLICATIONS OF THE FUND.

The Fund also from time to time collects, and places at the disposal of the hospitals and the public, information on points of interest, and appoints special Committees to enquire into and report upon questions of difficulty affecting hospitals.
