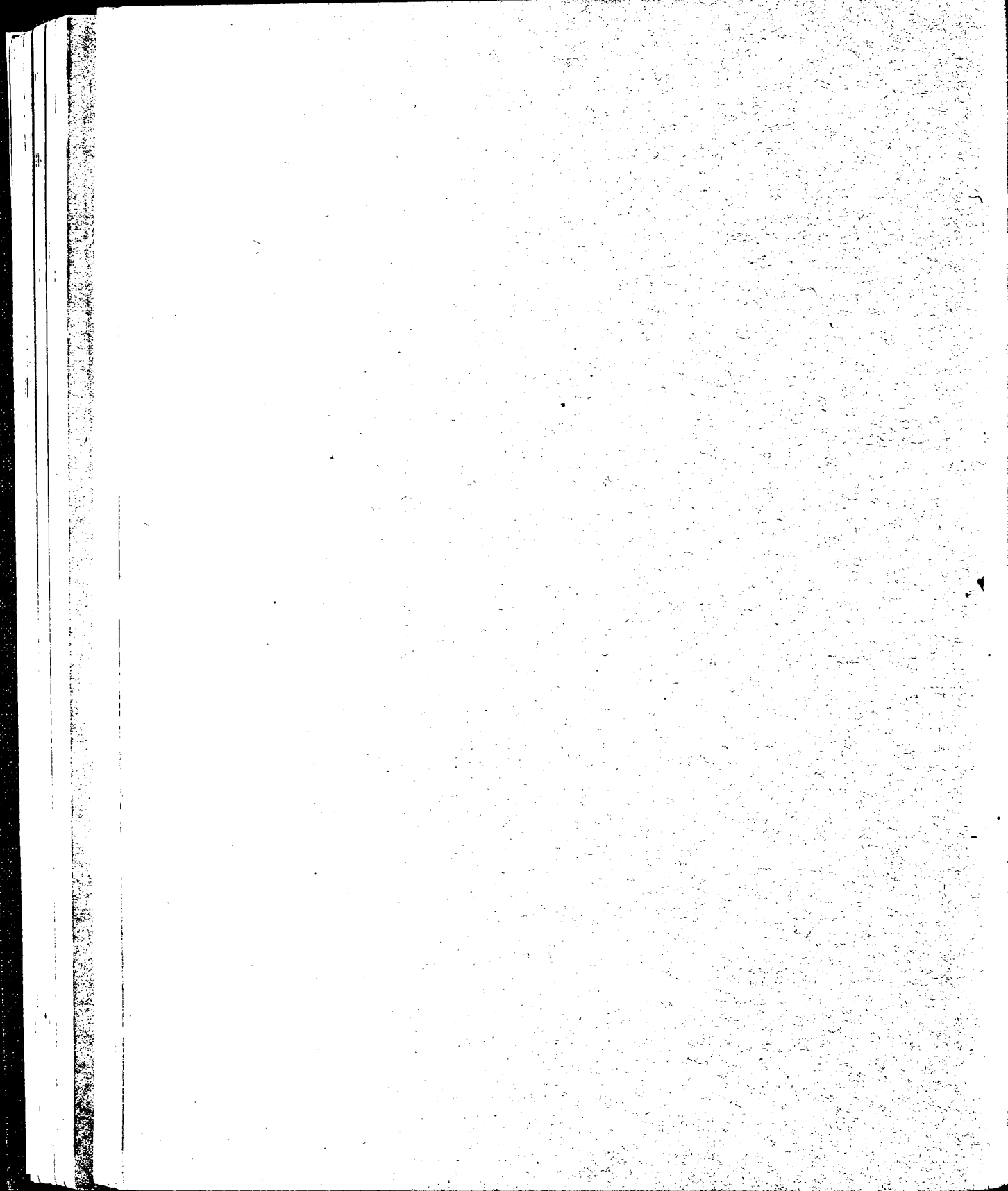

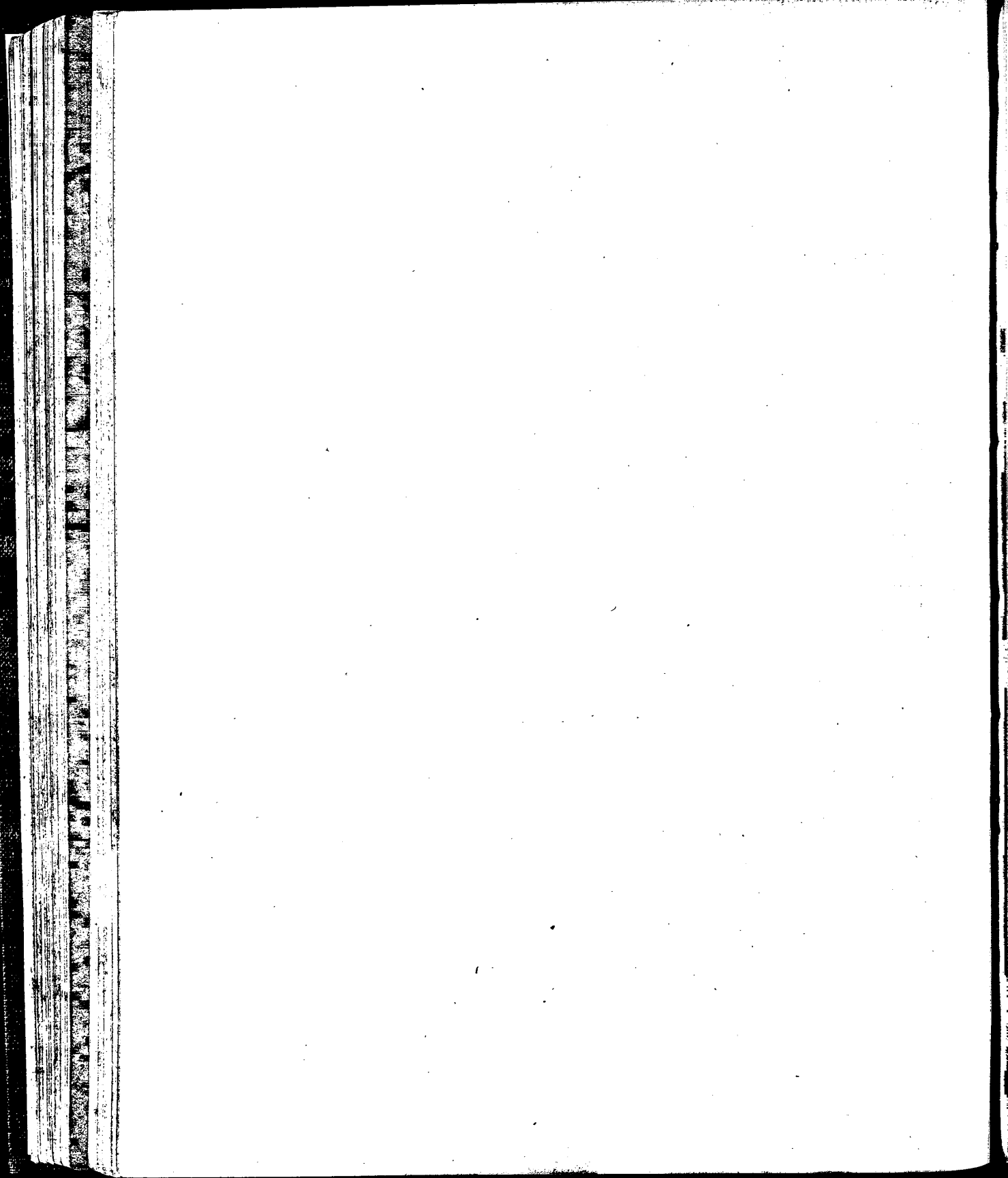

# REPORT OF THE GENERAL COUNCIL

*For the Year ending 31st December, 1919.*

1. The appointment of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales as President of the Fund will make the year 1919 a landmark in its history. His Royal Highness presided over the Annual Meeting of the General Council in April, and in December over the Distribution Meeting, a full report of which appears on page 10. It is a source of great gratification to the Members of the General Council that the Chair occupied with such benefit to the Fund by His late Majesty King Edward VII. from 1897 to 1901 and His present Majesty King George V. from 1901 to 1910 is once more occupied by the heir to the throne.

2. Before leaving for Canada and the United States on August 5, His Royal Highness appointed the Marquess of Cambridge, the Earl of Iveagh and the Right Honourable James W. Lowther, Speaker of the House of Commons, a Committee to exercise the powers of President during his absence from the United Kingdom, which lasted till December 1. The Council are greatly indebted to this Committee for their services.

3. The total receipts for the year 1919 were £201,477 os. 9d., of which £8,422 2s. 2d. were contributions to Capital, and £193,054 18s. 7d. receipts on General Account.

5. The amount distributed, which had reached £200,000 for the first time in 1918, was increased to £230,000 chiefly in order to assist the hospitals in meeting the expenditure rendered necessary by the postponement of renewals and repairs during the war. The increase was thus an exceptional one made for a special purpose which will not recur.

6. The needs of the hospitals for ordinary maintenance purposes, however, have continued to show a rapid increase. According to the figures published in the Fund's Statistical Report, the total ordinary expenditure of the London Hospitals in 1918 was £1,946,155 as against £1,724,288 in 1917; and the excess over 1913, which in 1917 was £580,500, amounted in 1918 to £803,217. Out of a total of 15,963 beds available in 1918 the average number in daily occupation by naval and military patients was 3,685, or 29 more than in 1917. The sum of £334,747 was received from the authorities towards the treatment of these naval and military patients as against £238,960 in 1917. The balance, amounting to £468,470, represents the additional ordinary expenditure which fell on the funds of the voluntary hospitals of London during 1918, an increase of nearly 41 per cent. on the expenditure in 1913. A large part of this increased expenditure is due to the rise in prices, the development of expensive treatments and the provision of additional beds, and will therefore give the hospitals a claim to larger permanent support from the public.\*

7. As will be obvious from the figures given in paragraph 4, the exceptional increase in the distribution was only rendered possible by drawing on the reserves which resulted from exceptional legacies and donations received during the war. The amount actually required to make up £230,000, after allowing for the expenses of the year, was £46,030 19s. 2d. It is clear that the maintenance of the distribution even at £200,000 will require a considerably larger income than was received in 1919, unless the reserves are to be further depleted, while the exceptionally urgent needs of the hospitals at the present time render a substantial increase in the normal distribution more than ever desirable.

8. Of the amount distributed, £218,000 was given to London Hospitals, and £12,000 to Consumption Sanatoria and Convalescent Homes taking London patients, as against £190,000 and £10,000 respectively in 1918.

9. The £218,000 granted by the Fund to London Hospitals was applied as to £164,775 in aid of general maintenance, £9,850 to the reduction of debts on maintenance account, £12,025 towards improvements schemes already undertaken or in reduction of liabilities on such schemes, and £31,350 in aid of schemes which it is proposed to carry out in the near future. Grants for maintenance amounted to £22,450 more than in 1917, or £14,375 more than in 1918.

10. Of the £12,000 distributed by the Convalescent Homes Committee, £8,770 was allocated to Consumption Sanatoria, and £3,230 to Convalescent Homes. The grants to Sanatoria enabled 66 beds to be reserved for the use of patients in London Hospitals as



compared with 64 last year. The Convalescent Homes Committee comment on the shortage of Sanatorium beds for women patients.

11. The total sum distributed amongst Hospitals, Convalescent Homes and Consumption Sanatoria during the last ten years (after deducting conditional grants to the extent of £2,500 that have been allowed to lapse) is £1,754,500. Since the foundation of the Fund a total amount of £2,888,416 8s. 5d. has been distributed. The average of the 23 distributions during the whole period has been £125,583 6s. 5d.

12. During the year the amount spent on the administration of the Fund was £4,085 17s. 9d., or £2 os. 6d. per £100 of the total received, as compared with £3,672 19s. 2d., or £1 13s. 7d. per £100 in the previous year. The average yearly outlay in this respect for the whole period since the inauguration of the Fund has been £2,954, the corresponding percentage of the receipts being £1 5s. 5d., or less than 3½d. in every £1 received.

13. His Majesty the King, Patron of the Fund, has been graciously pleased to continue his annual subscription of £1,000. Her Majesty the Queen, Her Majesty Queen Alexandra and His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales have also been pleased to subscribe generously to the Fund, as have also their Royal Highnesses Prince Albert, Princess Mary, and many other Members of the Royal Family.

14. The Fund again received annual subscriptions of £5,000 from Mr. Walter Morrison, £4,000 from the Drapers' Company, £1,000 from the late Viscount Astor, and £1,000 from the Merchant Taylors' Company. The contributions also included annual subscriptions of £525 from Lloyds Bank, Limited, and of £500 from the Earl of Iveagh, from Sir John R. Ellerman, Bt. (in addition to a special donation of £500), from Mr. Robert Fleming, from Messrs. Morgan, Grenfell & Co., from Messrs. N. M. Rothschild & Sons, and from the family of the late Sir S. Neumann, Bt. ; and donations of £1,000 from Sir Frederick Green (a member of the Distribution Committee), £699 10s. 9d. from "S.D.R.S.D.," £500 from the Clothworkers' Company and from the Japanese Explosives Co., Ltd., and £385 from the profits of the charity cricket match, Surrey *versus* Middlesex, played at the Oval in July.

15. The amount contributed by the League of Mercy was again increased to £17,000, or £1,000 more than in 1918. The total amount contributed to the Fund by the League since its foundation in 1899 is now £293,000, apart from the sums awarded by the League to institutions outside the area of the Fund's distribution. The Council are deeply grateful to the large number of voluntary workers to whose efforts the continued success of the League of Mercy has been due.

16. Legacies received during the year included a further £10,000 from the estate of the late Brigade-Surgeon John Law, on account of residue ; £5,000 from the estate of the late Mr. James B. Dugdale ; £3,739 17s. 8d. from the estate of the late Sir Julius Charles Wernher, Bt., further on account of residue left to capital ; £5,000 from the estate of the late Mr. Samuel

Lewis, further on account of residue ; £3,000 from the estate of the late Mr. William Arthur Sturdy ; and £2,500 from the Executors of the late Mrs. Sarah Morris—" Mr. and Mrs. John Morris Memorial Fund"—in the exercise of their discretionary powers.

17. In August, 1919, the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem, through their Joint War Committee, asked the King's Fund to undertake the distribution of the surplus funds available for hospitals in the London area. The conditions of this distribution will be the same as those of the similar distribution made by the Joint Committee itself amongst hospitals outside London—that is, grants can be made only to hospitals which can and will treat ex-sailors or ex-soldiers, and only in aid of definite schemes of extension or improvement that will be matured (*i.e.*, finally settled in the form in which they are to be carried out when circumstances permit) by March 31, 1921.

The amount of surplus Red Cross funds thus entrusted to the King's Fund for allocation will be £250,000; and the special distribution is expected to take place about the middle of 1920.

18. The question of hospital extensions has for some time been engaging the special attention of the Distribution Committee. By the end of 1917 schemes had been notified which, if they were all carried out, would have the effect of adding 1,750 to the number of beds available in 1913. By the end of 1918 the number of additional beds provided and contemplated amounted to about 4,000, of which about 1,000 had already been opened since 1913, and the Distribution Committee had begun a detailed examination of all these schemes, partly in connection with the pending special distribution of surplus Red Cross funds, and partly for the general purpose of securing that no scheme should be undertaken without due regard to financial practicability, and to the general effect of all the schemes taken together.

19. Every eligible hospital which applied for a grant was inspected and reported upon, as hitherto, by two of the Fund's visitors, one medical and the other lay. The inspection of Consumption Sanatoria, which had been prevented for three years by the restrictions on travelling, was resumed in 1919.

20. The Council regret to record the death of Mr. H. B. Irving, who had been a visitor for the Fund since 1917.

The Council have also to regret the retirement of the Right Hon. Thomas Burt through ill-health. He was one of their original members, having been appointed to the General Council in 1897. The Council also regret the resignation of Lord Knutsford.

21. The President of the Local Government Board, in pursuance of his powers under the Act, has again appointed Messrs. Deloitte, Plender, Griffiths & Co., Chartered Accountants, to audit the accounts of the Fund for the year. They have been the Honorary Auditors since January, 1898, during which period they have rendered the Fund very valuable service.

22. The Council are under great obligations to the Newspaper Press for the assistance

they have rendered in the past, and continue to rely upon their kindly co-operation in obtaining for the Fund wider publicity and support. Their help is more than ever valuable at a time like the present, when hospital expenditure has enormously increased, when the subscribing power of many regular contributors has diminished, and when, therefore, it becomes more and more important that the special value of the work of the voluntary hospitals, and their claims to increased support, should be brought home to a wider public.

## Distribution Meeting of President and General Council.

A Meeting of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London for the purpose of awarding grants to the Hospitals, Convalescent Homes, and Consumption Sanatoria for the year, was held on Tuesday morning, December 16, 1919, at St. James's Palace, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales being in the chair.

Hertz, D.D.), the Earl of Iveagh, the Viscount Knutsford, the Viscount Mersey, the Viscount Farquhar, the Viscount Sandhurst, Lord Revelstoke, Lord Stamfordham, Lord Somerleyton (Honorary Secretary), the President of the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds (the Rt. Hon. the Lord Mayor), the Chairman of the County Council (Lord Downham), the President of the Royal College of Physicians (Sir Norman Moore, Bt.), the President of the Royal College of Surgeons (Major-General Sir George Makins), the Rt. Hon. Sir T. Vezey Strong, the Rt. Hon. Sir Horace Marshall, Sir William Church, Bt., Sir Walter Lawrence, Bt., Lt.-Gen. Sir Alfred Keogh, Sir Owen Philipps, M.P., Sir Henry Burdett, Sir William H. Bennett, Sir William J. Collins, Sir Frederick M. Fry (Honorary Secretary), Sir Geo. Lawson Johnston, Sir Cooper Perry, Sir John Craggs, Sir John Tweedy, Mr. John G. Griffiths (Honorary Secretary), Mr. Yvon R. Eccles.

LORD SOMERLEYTON (Honorary Secretary) read the Minutes of the last Meeting, which were confirmed, and reported letters of regret from the following:—

The Lord Lieutenant of the County of London (the Marquess of Crewe), the Rt. Hon. James W. Lowther, M.P. (Speaker of the House of Commons), the Bishop of London, the Bishop of Southwark, Cardinal Bourne, the Marquess of Cambridge, the Earl of Bessborough, the Viscount Burnham, Lord Murray of Elibank, Lord Stuart of Wortley, the Hon. Algernon H. Mills, the Postmaster-General (the Rt. Hon. Albert Illingworth, M.P.), the Minister of Health (the Rt. Hon. Christopher Addison, M.D., M.P.), the Governor of the Bank of England (Sir Brian Cokayne), the Rt. Hon. Thomas Burt, Sir Francis H. Champneys, Bt., Mr. W. J. H. Whittall.

LORD REVELSTOKE (the Honorary Treasurer) said that the receipts on general account to December 6, after deducting expenses, amounted to £158,338 11s. 9d. This amount corresponded very closely with the estimate which was before the Council at their meeting on November 7, when the amount to be distributed was determined. The Council would remember that it was anticipated that if the League of Mercy were to be in a position to make the same contribution as in 1918, the total receipts for the year would be approximately £180,000; but that with the help of the undistributed balance of the donation from the late Viscount Astor in 1917, and the receipts from the estate of the late Isabella, Countess of Wilton, in 1916, it would be possible to distribute the sum of £230,000, as recommended by the Executive Committee. This recommendation was adopted at the Council Meeting held in November last, and the allocation of this £230,000 was part of the business to which the Council would be invited to give their attention to-day.

Sir WILLIAM COLLINS, in making the annual statement on behalf of the League of Mercy, said he took the opportunity of stating how pleased the League of Mercy were that His Royal Highness had become their Grand President. The amount which the League would be in a position to hand over to the Fund this year was £17,000, being an advance of £1,000 over the figure of last year, and £3,000 over that of the last pre-war year. This would bring the total amount provided by the League to the Fund up to £293,000. In addition, the League had made grants to Hospitals within its area of collection outside the County of London amounting to £32,895, making a total of £325,895 paid by the League to the voluntary hospitals in or around London during the last twenty years.

**THE PRINCE OF WALES :**

I would wish to thank Sir William Collins for the kind way in which he has referred to my presidency of the League of Mercy. I consider it a very great privilege to become President of the League, and I look forward to presiding at its annual meeting, which will be to-morrow afternoon. I must also thank the League for the splendid sum to be handed over to the King's Fund for the current year.

Sir JOHN TWEEDY (the Chairman of the Distribution Committee) presented the report of that Committee.

Sir FREDERICK M. FRY (Honorary Secretary) presented the list of awards.

Sir WILLIAM H. BENNETT (the Chairman of the Convalescent Homes Committee) presented the Report of that Committee.

Mr. JOHN G. GRIFFITHS (Honorary Secretary) presented the list of awards.

The PRINCE OF WALES, in moving the adoption of the Reports and Awards, said :—

My Lords and Gentlemen,—I have first the honour to read the following letter from His Majesty the King :—

“ Buckingham Palace,

“ December 15, 1919.

“ Please convey to the Members of the General Council my hearty congratulations upon the results achieved by the Fund during the past year.

“ The decision to make specially increased grants this year to the London Hospitals on exceptional grounds consequent upon the War has my cordial approval.

“ The munificent gift of £250,000 from the Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John comes as a splendid encouragement to all who have at heart the work of the Voluntary Hospitals—while the fact that the Distribution Committee has been asked to undertake the apportionment of this sum is a testimony to public confidence in the Fund.

“ I trust that we may count upon increased support from the ever generous public in order to enable such extension of buildings to be carried out as will make it possible for the Hospitals to keep abreast of the times in their great mission of healing and mercy.”

“ In conclusion, I desire to express my gratitude to the Chairmen, Secretaries and Members of the various Committees for their valuable, untiring, and devoted services.

GEORGE R.I.

This is the first distribution meeting since I became President, though I had the pleasure of presiding at the Annual Meeting last May, and I realise more than ever what a big thing the Fund is. When it was founded by King Edward in 1897, it was quite rightly acclaimed as a great success because it distributed £57,000 in its first year. Under my father's presidency the distribution reached £150,000, the sum regarded at the outset as the goal at which to aim. Last year the amount distributed was £200,000. This year it is £230,000. It is no light task to be President of such a Fund; especially as, by the Act of Incorporation, the proceedings of every Council and Committee meeting require the President's personal approval. The first point I wish to make is that the increase in the distribution, from £200,000 to £230,000, is an exceptional increase for a special purpose arising out of the war. In normal times the aim of the Fund has always been to increase the distribution gradually, so that there should be no going back. When the war broke out, however, this rule was departed from, and the distribution was reduced. This was because all new building schemes were suspended, and very little money was wanted for capital grants. Now, at the end of the war, we depart again from the rule and make an exceptionally large increase, because extra money is needed for renewals, repairs, and other building operations which have fallen into arrear. We should not, of course, expect to maintain this exceptional increase in another year unless the Fund is placed by the liberality of the public in a position to do so; but we should be free to start again from the more normal basis of 1918, disregarding altogether these fluctuations caused by the war. That the present distribution of £230,000 is exceptional becomes obvious if we compare it with the total estimated receipts, which amount only to £180,000. It is true that, this time last year, when the Council distributed £6,000 more than its estimated income, the deficit was made up before December 31st. If any generous donors feel moved to help us to the same happy result this year, there is still a fortnight left, and I should be most grateful for any Christmas presents to the Fund. In the meantime we have to make these extra grants out of the reserve formed by the legacy of the late Isabella, Countess of Wilton, in 1916, and the balance of the gift of the late Viscount Astor in 1917. But £50,000 is a very deep dip into this reserve, and, if we are to help the Hospitals over their difficulties in the next few years without drawing on our permanent funds, we shall need a much larger annual income, which I earnestly hope the charitably disposed will provide. The receipts for the year include, besides the annual subscription of £1,000 with which His Majesty the King honours the Fund, contributions of £5,000 from Mr. Walter Morrison, £4,000 from the Drapers' Company, and £1,000 each from the late Viscount Astor, from Sir John Ellerman, from Sir Frederick Green—a member of the Distribution Committee—and from the Merchant Taylors' Company; and the magnificent total of £17,000 contributed by the League of Mercy. I am pleased to see that the share, so kindly allocated to the Fund, of the profits of the Charity Cricket Match, Surrey versus Middlesex, played at the Oval last July, came to £385. I saw that match myself. Legacies have included a further £10,000 from the estate of the late Brigade-Surgeon John Law, £5,000 left by the late Mr. James B. Dugdale, and a further £5,000 from the estate of the late Mr. Samuel Lewis, which has now added no less than £472,000 to the capital of the Fund. The Distribution Committee again draw attention to the large number of extension schemes put forward by the Hospitals. Last year the Committee announced their intention of making a complete survey of all such schemes, and invited the Hospitals to send in particulars. The returns to date show a total of about 1,000 beds already provided since 1913, nearly 3,000 definitely contemplated, and more than 1,000 foreshadowed in the future. The Distribution Com-

mittee estimate that these extensions would cost at least £3,000,000 to build and half a million a year to maintain. It is no wonder that the Committee wish to consider the general effect of all the schemes taken as a whole. I do not want, and I am sure the Distribution Committee do not want, to discourage the prudent extension of Voluntary Hospitals. We of this Council believe in the Voluntary Hospital system, which the King's Fund has done, and is doing, so much to maintain. The Voluntary Hospitals ought to expand as the demand increases for the services they are best fitted to supply. But the financial resources of the voluntary system are not unlimited, and though by energetic cultivation they can be made to grow, the process of expansion must be conducted with prudence, or there may be a real risk of a breakdown. This prudent expansion of the Voluntary Hospitals will be greatly assisted by the action of the Joint Committee of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem, in placing at the disposal of the Fund the large sum of £250,000 out of their surplus funds. Under the conditions laid down by the Joint Committee this is to be applied, on their behalf, to definite schemes for extensions or improvements at Hospitals, in the area of the Fund, which can and will treat ex-sailors or ex-soldiers. I am sure that everybody will be keen about that, and will realise what our duty is to those men. The special distribution will thus assist, not only such schemes of extension as pass the scrutiny of the Distribution Committee, but also schemes for the improvement of existing accommodation. The British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John are doing a great service to the Voluntary Hospitals by giving them a share of their surplus. By entrusting the King's Fund with the allocation of £250,000, they recognise the value of the special knowledge which it possesses, and, in gratefully accepting their offer, we have gladly placed this knowledge at their disposal. The Fund has never before accepted any gift subject to conditions which would prevent the General Council from distributing it in the same proportions as the general distribution. Sir Ernest Cassel's great gifts of £31,500 and £28,000 were no exception to this rule, since they were given to increase the ordinary grants by a fixed percentage. But we have willingly made an exception in the case of the Red Cross surplus funds; and have agreed to the same conditions as those laid down by the Joint Committee for the rest of the country. I wish to thank them most warmly, in your name and in my own, for their generous action. The Convalescent Homes Committee have been allotted a larger sum than last year, and have thus been enabled to meet the claims of the Homes which had, during the war, been either turned into military hospitals or closed because of air-raids. The Committee have also been able to increase the number of beds secured in Consumption Sanatoria for the use of London Hospitals. Unfortunately, they have, so far, found it impossible to get as many beds for women patients as are asked for by the Hospitals. There have been very few changes of personnel during the year, but the Fund has lost the services of an able visitor by the death of Mr. H. B. Irving. It now only remains for me to express my thanks to the Distribution Committee and the Convalescent Homes Committee, together with the Visitors and other officers, for all the work they have done. I would specially thank the Speaker of the House of Commons, Lord Cambridge, and Lord Iveagh, for having exercised on my behalf, during my absence overseas, the powers of President which, as Governors, they exercised for so many years in their own names. I was fortunate in being able to leave the affairs of the Fund in such experienced hands. I now move the adoption of the Reports.

The Lord Mayor (Sir EDWARD COOPER), having seconded the motion, the adoption of the Reports and Awards was put, and carried unanimously.

On the motion of SIR ALFRED KEOGH, seconded by the Chairman of the London County Council (Lord DOWNHAM), it was resolved "that the cheques for the grants should be posted on Friday, December 19, except in the case of grants for the reservation of beds in Consumption Sanatoria during 1920, the cheques for which should be posted on January 1."

#### ARRANGEMENTS FOR 1920.

The PRINCE OF WALES then said :—

My Lords and Gentlemen,—I have now to introduce the business relating to 1920. In exercise of my powers as President, I intend to reappoint all the present Members of the Council and Committee and Officers. The draft resolutions delegating powers to the Committees are before you. If they are approved, the meeting of next year's Council to adopt them need only be formal. The increase in the estimate for office expenses is not wholly caused by the general rise in prices. It is partly due to the fact that there will be two distributions—the ordinary distribution in the autumn and the distribution of the £250,000 from the Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John. This is to be quite separate and made at a different time of year. It will mean a great deal of extra work for the Distribution Committee, and most of this will come in 1920, since the Joint Committee wish the grants to be paid over to the Hospitals by March 31, 1921. They consider that by that time the schemes should be matured, although of course the actual building need not be begun so soon.

There was moved by the Chief Rabbi (the Rev. J. H. HERTZ, D.D.), seconded by the President of the Royal College of Physicians (Sir NORMAN MOORE, Bt.), and approved, a Resolution delegating powers to the Finance Committee, Distribution Committee, and Convalescent Homes Committee.

On the motion of VISCOUNT KNUTSFORD, seconded by the President of the Royal College of Surgeons (Major-General Sir GEORGE MAKINS), a Resolution was approved delegating further powers to the Finance Committee.

On the motion of Viscount FARQUHAR, seconded by Sir WALTER LAWRENCE, Bt., a Resolution was approved delegating powers to the Executive Committee.

Viscount SANDHURST moved a vote of thanks to His Royal Highness for presiding, and Sir HORACE MARSHALL, in seconding the resolution, said how delighted the Council felt that His Royal Highness had returned to this country in such excellent health, and how much they thanked him for the great work he had done for the British Empire.

The Resolution was carried by acclamation.

The PRINCE OF WALES, in acknowledging the vote of thanks, said : "I am certainly very glad indeed to be back in the old country. I had a wonderful time in Canada, but, as probably most of you know, I am not going to be here very long now. His Majesty the King is sending me to Australia and New Zealand, which will necessitate my leaving this country probably about March, and being away six or seven months. That will mean that I shall miss the meeting of this Council in May. As to my movements later in the year, I have no idea at the present moment, but I look forward to meeting the Council again, I hope, on my return from my next journey."

The proceedings then terminated.



## Annual Meeting of President and General Council.

---

The Annual Meeting of the President and General Council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, to receive the Accounts and the Report for the year 1919, was held at St. James's Palace on Friday, April 30, 1920, at 11.30 A.M., the Earl of Donoughmore, K.P., being in the chair.

Sir Horace Marshall, Sir William Church, Bt., Sir Walter Lawrence, Bt., Sir Francis H. Champneys, Bt., Sir William H. Bennett, Sir William J. Collins, Sir Frederick M. Fry (Hon. Secretary), Sir John Craggs, Sir John Tweedy, Mr. John G. Griffiths (Hon. Secretary), Mr. Yvon R. Eccles.

LORD SOMERLEYTON (Hon. Secretary) read the Minutes of the last two meetings, which were confirmed, and reported letters of regret from the following:—The Viscount Finlay, The Lord-Lieutenant of the County of London (The Marquess of Crewe), The Rt. Hon. James W. Lowther, M.P. (Speaker of the House of Commons), The Bishop of London, Cardinal Bourne, the Chief Rabbi (the Rev. J. H. Hertz, D.D.), the Marquess of Cambridge, the Earl of Bessborough, the Earl of Iveagh, the Viscount Sandhurst, Lord Stamfordham, the Hon. N. Charles Rothschild, the Hon. Algernon H. Mills, the Rt. Hon. W. Crooks, M.P., Lieut.-Colonel Sir Alfred Keogh, Sir Owen Philipps, M.P., Sir Cooper Perry, Sir George Lawson Johnston, Mr. Robert Fleming, and Mr. W. J. H. Whittall.

LORD SOMERLEYTON (Hon. Secretary) said: Lord Donoughmore, my Lords and Gentlemen: We have only just received the news to-day, or late last night, of the death of Sir Henry Burdett, who was in many ways the originator of the idea of this Fund. As one of its oldest members, I should like to move a resolution expressing our deepest regret at the loss we have sustained and our sympathy with the relatives. Sir Henry Burdett rarely missed a meeting of the Council since the foundation of the Fund twenty-three years ago. He was also the originator of the solution of that problem which is being discussed so much at the present day, the Uniform System of Hospital Accounts; although Mr. Griffiths and others have had a great deal to do with the working of it, the original idea came from Sir Henry Burdett. I am sure, my Lord,

that I am only voicing the general feeling of this Council in expressing our sincere and deep regret.

Sir WILLIAM COLLINS said: My Lords and Gentlemen, as an Hon. Secretary of the League of Mercy, of which Sir Henry Burdett was for many years the Hon. Treasurer, I wish to associate myself and also the League with this resolution of regret and condolence.

The Resolution was put from the Chair, the Council rising in their places, and carried unanimously.

Lord REVELSTOKE (the Hon. Treasurer) in presenting the Account of Receipts and Expenditure and the Balance Sheet for the year ended December 31, 1919, said that there had been one change in the form of the Accounts. As the Council were aware, the Act of Incorporation of the Fund gave rather exceptional powers of investment outside securities authorised by the Trustee Acts, whenever the donors so desired, and ever since the Act came into operation the funds which must be invested in trust securities had been shown separately from the funds to which these special powers applied. These two Funds, formerly designated Trust Fund and Non-Trust Fund, were now called "A" Fund and "B" Fund respectively. The Council would remember that at the meeting held in December last His Royal Highness the President called attention to the fact that the amount distributed was being increased from £200,000 to £230,000, mainly for the purpose of assisting the Hospitals to meet the cost of renewals and repairs deferred owing to the war, and that in order to make this exceptional increase it was estimated that about £50,000 would have to be withdrawn from the reserves created by exceptional legacies and donations received during the war. The Council would notice from the accounts now before them that the amount actually drawn from the reserves was £46,000, or about £4,000 less than was anticipated.

Lord DONOUGHMORE formally moved the adoption of the Accounts.

The resolution, having been seconded by Sir T. VEZEY STRONG, was put and carried unanimously.

Sir FREDERICK M. FRY (Hon. Secretary) presented the Draft Report of the Council for the year 1919.

The EARL OF DONOUGHMORE, in moving the adoption of the Report, said:—

My Lords and Gentlemen,—I have first of all the honour of reading the following cablegram from His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, President of the Fund:—

I much regret that my absence in Australasia makes it impossible for me to be present at the Annual Meeting this year. Please convey to the General Council my best wishes for the continued success of the Fund.

EDWARD, P.

I am sure we shall all desire to convey to His Royal Highness our loyal thanks for his message and our sincere wish that in his journey this year he will repeat the triumphant success which he undoubtedly achieved on his tour last year. I do not think I need say very much in commending the Report to you, especially as it deals with matters of which you have a much more intimate knowledge than I have myself. I should like first of all to say that one of our colleagues on the President's Powers Committee, Lord Finlay, has asked me to express his great regret that his engagements prevent his being here to-day; I am sure we can all understand his

absence, as he is a very busy man. We are deeply sensible of the privilege His Royal Highness has conferred upon us in delegating to us, during his absence, his powers as President under the Act of Parliament incorporating the Fund. The President being merely absent for a time from the United Kingdom, and not wholly out of reach in case of urgency, the exercise of these powers, which, as you know, are very extensive, does not involve the same degree of responsibility as was undertaken by the three Governors who did the work so well from 1910 to 1919, when the office of President was in abeyance. Nevertheless, as everyone must realise, the responsibility exercised jointly by the President's Powers Committee and the General Council at the present moment is by no means a light one. We all confidently expect great things from the appointment of the Prince of Wales as President; and we have good reason for expecting them, knowing the records of his predecessors in the presidency, His late Majesty King Edward and His present Majesty King George. We also realise the great position which His Royal Highness has already taken in British public work, and the Fund is to be congratulated that it can look forward to having his assistance in the future. At the same time, the Hospitals are passing through difficulties even greater than those with which they were faced when the King's Fund was founded. According to the estimate recently issued by the Honorary Secretaries of the Fund, the total expenditure of the London Hospitals in 1919, taken together, was about £2,100,000. Towards this their income, including the grants from the three Central Funds, amounted to about £1,900,000; so that the deficit on the year's working was £200,000, or approximately 10 per cent. Now, if we turn back to the letter in which King Edward VII., then Prince of Wales, inaugurated the Fund in 1897, the year of the Diamond Jubilee of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, we find that the annual deficit of the London Hospitals at that time was estimated at about £70,000, which, by an interesting coincidence, was also almost exactly 10 per cent., the total expenditure being then only £700,000. The amount distributed by the Fund in its first year was £57,000. Its subsequent success is reflected in the Accounts before us to-day, which show that last year the Fund distributed £230,000, of which £116,000 was derived from investments. We know, of course, that the Voluntary Hospitals of London, with the aid of the Fund, survived the anxieties of 1897, and paid their way until the end of the war. Their expenditure during those twenty-three years increased threefold; but their income, including the Fund's grants, also increased at the same rate; and even in 1919 the deficit for the year was only the same percentage as in 1897. But we must not be too optimistic when we begin to think of the prospects of 1920 and the years to come. Of one thing we are certain: the present difficulties are not the result of any failure on the part of the Hospitals, but arise solely from the general financial effects of the war. In order to surmount them very great energy will be needed and possibly even some new departure, requiring powers of imagination and originality equal to those shown by King Edward VII., when he inaugurated this Fund twenty-three years ago, if the Hospitals are not to get into serious difficulties and to suffer in their great work. The result of King Edward's action then has been that the Fund now distributes a sum equal to one-tenth of the expenditure of the London Hospitals, and distributes it so as to give most help to those Hospitals which most need it, while at the same time encouraging them to assist themselves by efficiency and economy of management. I certainly feel that it is for us to see to it that when our President returns to his work in this chair he will find the Fund as active as ever in its task of assisting in the maintenance, extension, and improvement of the Voluntary Hospitals in London. Before I sit down there is one other

announcement I ought to make. In an ordinary year there would not be another meeting of the Council at St. James's Palace until the Distribution meeting in December, when we all hope that His Royal Highness may be again in the chair. But this year there will be an extra meeting about the middle of July, for the purpose of deciding on the distribution of the sum of £250,000 which the Joint Finance Committee of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem has entrusted to the Fund for distribution in aid of schemes of extension or improvement which will directly or indirectly increase the facilities for the treatment of ex-sailors or ex-soldiers at the London Voluntary Hospitals. I am glad to see Sir Arthur Stanley here, and we shall look forward to the distribution of this money in the middle of July. I now beg to move the adoption of the draft Report.

The GOVERNOR OF THE BANK OF ENGLAND (Mr. Norman), in seconding the resolution, said he desired to echo the words of the Chairman expressing the sense the members of the President's Powers Committee had of the great honour and privilege conferred upon them by His Royal Highness in delegating to them his powers, an honour and privilege which he especially felt as representing the institution by reason of his connection with which he was present that day..

The adoption of the Report was then put and carried unanimously.

The CHAIRMAN OF THE LONDON COUNTY COUNCIL (Mr. John W. Gilbert), in moving a vote of thanks to Lord Donoughmore for presiding, said he was sure that all present would agree that the statement made from the chair that day would prove a great advantage to the Fund.

The resolution was seconded by Mr. JOHN G. GRIFFITHS, who said that they were all very greatly indebted to the three members of the President's Powers Committee, Lord Donoughmore, Lord Finlay, and the Governor of the Bank of England, for undertaking the work. It was then put and carried unanimously.

Lord DONOUGHMORE having briefly acknowledged the vote of thanks, the proceedings terminated.

## Report of the Distribution Committee.

(1) The President and General Council have this year appropriated the sum of £218,000 for distribution amongst the London Hospitals, as against £190,000 in 1918, an increase of £28,000.

(2) This increase was authorised partly in consequence of a report of the Distribution Committee drawing attention to the exceptional expenditure which hospitals would have to incur on renewals and repairs deferred during the war. The Committee have accordingly dealt with the greater part of the additional £28,000, not as a permanent increase in the annual distribution, but as a special addition to this year's total to assist the hospitals in meeting an exceptional liability which arises directly out of the war. As, however, renewals and repairs, even if exceptional in amount in any particular year, are none the less part of the ordinary cost of maintaining a hospital, the assistance afforded by the Fund for this purpose is given as part of its ordinary contribution to maintenance; and the only visible result is that the grants to maintenance are larger than they would have been had the financial considerations been based, in the usual way, solely on last year's audited accounts.

(3) The number of Hospitals applying for grants is 107.

(4) Of the total amount distributed, £174,625 has been applied in the form of grants to maintenance. This is an increase of £14,375 over the corresponding total in 1918.

(5) As was to be expected, an exceptionally large number of applications was received for grants in aid of improvement or extension; since the hospitals are now proceeding with the preparation of plans which had been deferred during the war. The capital grants made by the Fund this year amount to £43,375, as compared with £29,750 in 1918, an increase of £13,625. This year's total includes £12,025 in reduction of capital liabilities already incurred, the remaining £31,350 being earmarked for schemes which it is proposed to carry out in the more or less near future.

(6) The schemes to which this sum of £31,350 is contributed this year do not by any means represent the whole of the applications for capital grants. For various reasons the

Committee thought it best to postpone the consideration of several of the more important applications till the next distribution. In the first place, some of the schemes are not yet sufficiently mature. In the second place, many of them involve the provision of additional beds, the full consideration of which has been deferred, for the reason given in a later paragraph, till such time as the Committee could make a general survey of all such schemes instead of dealing with them one by one. In the third place, the Fund will, in the early part of 1920, have an opportunity of making a survey of a very large number of schemes which are being and will be submitted in connection with the forthcoming distribution of surplus funds entrusted to the King's Fund by the Joint Committee of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem in aid of improvements or extensions to hospitals in the London area which can and will treat ex-soldiers or ex-sailors; and, this survey having been made, the Fund will have more complete material for considering these applications at the following ordinary distribution of the Fund in November 1920. In the fourth place, in no instance does it appear that the action of the Committee in postponing the question of a grant till next autumn will delay the date at which the hospital has any prospect of beginning to build.

For these reasons the Distribution Committee have confined their capital grants this year to schemes which seem to them to be specially urgent, and schemes which have already been postponed on account of the war for a long time since they were first submitted to the Fund.

(7) In their last report the Committee referred to the large number of schemes of extension involving additional beds, and stated that they proposed specially to invite all the hospitals concerned to furnish them with the latest particulars of all such proposals. The details received down to the end of November show a large increase on the numbers reported by the Committee last year. Out of 109 hospitals included in the prefatory note to the Fund's Statistical Report for 1918, more than 70 have returned particulars of additions or proposed additions to their 1913 bed accommodation, and of these 59 have schemes involving capital expenditure. There were, in 1913, 10,735 beds available in these 109 hospitals and in their country branches: and the number of additional beds for civilians (including ex-service men) reported by those hospitals which are able to give figures may be summarised as follows:—

Additional beds for civilians opened since 1913, after deducting beds closed	731
„ „ provided for, either before or after 1913, but not yet opened	331
„ „ definitely contemplated	2,927
„ „ indefinite or future	1,144

Besides these there would be 386 beds required to complete the original plans of hospitals which are only partially built, but the authorities of which do not at present contemplate taking any action.

(8) If all these schemes were to be carried out, very formidable liabilities would be

incurred both for capital cost and for annual maintenance. No detailed estimate can be given, but at the lowest probable figure the capital cost could not be less than £3,000,000 and the additional annual upkeep would exceed half a million. This capital expenditure, moreover, would be in addition to the cost of numerous schemes for bringing existing hospital accommodation up to date by the provision of new nurses' quarters, the enlargement of out-patient departments, and the making of other much-needed improvements which do not involve more beds. It is only in exceptional cases, therefore, that the Fund can take the responsibility of encouraging any scheme until a general survey has been made of all the proposals, from the point of view of geographical distribution, comparative urgency, and financial feasibility.

The Committee have accordingly refrained from making grants in aid of bed extensions except in a few particularly urgent cases, and have notified all hospitals which contemplate applying for grants from the special distribution of the Red Cross surplus funds in aid of schemes of extension or improvement that, where additional beds are proposed, the Fund will require definite and detailed replies to its usual questions as to "the reasons and considerations which have led to the formulation of the proposals" and "the prospect of provision for future maintenance."

(9) The following grants in aid of schemes of building expenditure are recommended for renewal under the two years rule:—

General Lying-in Hospital, £1,000 in 1917 to improvements.

Hospital and Home for Sick Children, Sydenham (now South-Eastern Hospital for Children), £75 in 1915 to central heating.

Queen Charlotte's Lying-in Hospital, £1,000 in 1913 and £650 in 1917 to new out-patient department.

Queen's Hospital for Children, £288 12s. 11d., balance of £1,000 in 1917 to improvements in the out-patient department.

St. Mary's Hospital for Women and Children, Plaistow, £1,500 in 1913 and £1,000 in 1917 to new nurses' home and out-patient department.

Victoria Hospital, £200 in 1916 to new heating apparatus.

(10) In dealing with questions of cost per bed the Committee have, as usual, distinguished between increases which are peculiar to individual hospitals and those which are due to the rise in prices and in wages, the difficulty of obtaining skilled service, the development of expensive special treatments, and other general causes. They have regarded the latter, in the absence of definite evidence to the contrary, as being covered by the *average* increases in cost, and have only taken into account cases where the cost is high in comparison with other hospitals or where there has been a disproportionate rise, and where the explanations tendered by the hospital concerned have seemed to them inadequate to account for the difference.

(11) The Committee desire once more to express their warm thanks to the Visitors, not only for the general evidence which their reports supply as to the efficiency of the various hospitals applying for grants, but also for numerous comments and suggestions, many of which the Committee recommend should be sent on with the grants to the institutions concerned. The Committee wish it to be understood that these extracts are sent in the first instance merely with a request for the observations of the Hospital Committee. The replies are communicated to next year's Visitors, so that ample opportunity is given for discussion before any criticism made by this year's Visitors comes up for further consideration at the next distribution.

(12) At their first meeting this year the Distribution Committee passed a resolution expressing to Sir William Church their great regret at his retirement from the Committee of which he had been Chairman for the past sixteen years, and placing on record their appreciation of his long and zealous service to the Fund and of the ability and courtesy with which he had presided over their meetings. They trust that he may long retain his active connection with the Fund as a member of the General Council.

(13) The details of the awards to the various hospitals are appended.

## Report of the Convalescent Homes Committee.

(1) The President and General Council have this year fixed the sum available for distribution amongst Convalescent Homes and Consumption Sanatoria at £12,000, as against £10,000 in 1918. This increased amount has assisted the Committee to meet the increased demands on the Fund, due to the reopening of Convalescent Homes closed during the war and to the unavoidable rise in the cost of maintenance of beds at Sanatoria, referred to in later paragraphs of this Report.

(2) The number of applications eligible for consideration amounted to 49 from Convalescent Homes and 9 from Consumption Sanatoria, as against 45 and 9 respectively last year.

(3) In dealing with all applications, whether from Sanatoria or from Convalescent Homes, the Committee have, as usual, taken into consideration the question of comparative urgency of need, as shown by the audited accounts and balance sheets of the various institutions to December 31st last. In the case of Consumption Sanatoria they have also taken note of the proportion of the total work of each institution which is covered by the receipts from public authorities. As these and other circumstances affecting the relative claims of the different institutions vary from year to year, it must not be assumed that a reduction in the grant to any particular institution, whether for maintenance or for capital purposes, or even the absence of a grant, implies dissatisfaction.

(4) Most of the Convalescent Homes which ceased, on account of the war, to be occupied by convalescent patients from London have been reopened during the course of 1919. The amount allotted to Convalescent Homes has therefore been increased, though not as much as would have been required had all these homes been doing their normal work for the whole of the year.

(5) The amount distributed to Consumption Sanatoria is also greater than last year, owing to the rise in the cost of maintaining beds and to the fact that the number of beds reserved by the Fund for the use of patients in London hospitals has been increased by two. The accommodation secured this year amounts to 66 beds at six Sanatoria, situated as follows :—

- 10 beds for children at the Children's Sanatorium, Holt, Norfolk.
- 4 beds at the Daneswood Sanatorium (Jewish), Woburn Sands, Beds.
- 10 beds at the Devon and Cornwall Sanatorium, South Brent, Devon.
- 6 beds at the Kelling Sanatorium, Holt, Norfolk.
- 24 beds at the Sanatorium of the National Association for the Establishment and Maintenance of Sanatoria for Workers, Benenden, Kent.
- 12 beds at the Northamptonshire Sanatorium, Creaton, Northants.

(6) The Committee recommend that the beds thus reserved be allocated amongst London hospitals as follows :—

Chest Hospitals :—

- 13 beds to the City of London Hospital for Diseases of the Chest.
- 6 beds to the Royal Hospital for Diseases of the Chest.

General Hospitals :—

- 2 beds to Charing Cross Hospital.
- 9 beds to Guy's Hospital.
- 1 bed to King's College Hospital.
- 11 beds to the London Hospital.
- 5 beds to the Middlesex Hospital.
- 1 bed to the Royal Free Hospital.
- 4 beds to St. George's Hospital.
- 2 beds to St. Mary's Hospital.
- 6 beds to St. Thomas's Hospital.
- 4 beds to University College Hospital.
- 2 beds to Westminster Hospital.

(7) In view of the universal demand for facilities for dealing with tuberculosis, the small number of men's beds which the general hospitals appear to be able to use in this way is a matter which may require further consideration next year. On the other hand, the Committee have been unable to secure enough women's beds to satisfy the demand.

(8) The inspection of Consumption Sanatoria in the country, which had been suspended since 1916, owing to the restrictions on travelling facilities both by rail and by motor, was resumed this year. The Committee are greatly indebted to the Visitors who volunteered for these distant journeys under present conditions, and are recommending that various extracts from their reports should be sent on with the grants for the observations of the Committees of the institutions concerned.

(9) The grants recommended to the various institutions are appended.

## TITLE AND CONSTITUTION.

The Fund was founded in 1897, under the title of "The Prince of Wales's Hospital Fund for London," by His late Majesty King Edward VII., then Prince of Wales, with the object of securing more efficient aid and support for the Hospitals of London, and of thus commemorating the Sixtieth Anniversary of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, by establishing the voluntary hospital system of London on a sound financial basis.

It was re-named "King Edward's Hospital Fund for London" in January 1902, after the accession of His Majesty King Edward VII.

By desire of King Edward, it was incorporated under that title, and its constitution settled, by King Edward's Hospital Fund for London Act, 1907 (7 Edw. 7, Ch. lxx.).

The Governing Body under the Act consists of the President and General Council.

His late Majesty King Edward VII. was President of the Fund, while Prince of Wales, from 1897 to 1901, and was subsequently its Patron during his reign from 1901 to 1910.

His present Majesty King George V. was President, as Prince of Wales, from 1901 to 1910, and is now Patron.

On April 18, 1919, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales was appointed President of the Fund.

From June 1910 to April 1919 the powers of the President were exercised by three Governors appointed by His Majesty pursuant to the provisions of the Act, the Right Hon. James W. Lowther, Speaker of the House of Commons, the Marquess of Cambridge, and Viscount Iveagh.

The work of the Fund is carried on under the General Council by the four standing Committees and the Officers as set out on pages 1 and 2. The rule is that no individual serves on more than one Committee.

## RULES AS TO APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS.

Under its present rules the Fund receives applications for grants from :

- (a) Hospitals situated in the County of London or within 9 miles from Charing Cross.
- (b) Convalescent Homes which are situated within these boundaries, or which, being situated outside, take a large proportion of patients from London.
- (c) Consumption Sanatoria which take patients from London, or which are prepared to place beds at the disposal of the Fund for the use of patients from London Hospitals.

The Fund does not, however, assist at present in the foundation of new institutions, or entertain applications from institutions which have not been in existence in a properly constituted form for a period of at least three years, or from dispensaries, nursing institutes, or other institutions not possessing beds for in-patients, or from institutions for the treatment of incurables or of mental cases, or from holiday homes as distinct from convalescent homes.

All institutions applying for grants are required to publish their accounts in accordance with the Revised Uniform System of Hospital Accounts (see page 67).

Every eligible Hospital and Sanatorium applying for a grant is annually inspected on behalf of the Fund by two Visitors, a medical man and a layman in each case, specially appointed for the purpose (see page 2).

In accordance with the rule laid down by the Founder of the Fund, in order that the hospitals should derive the greatest possible amount of assistance, the Fund does not receive "letters" of admission or recommendation in return for its grants.

Applications are invited in March, and the awards are made, on the recommendations of the Distribution and Convalescent Homes Committees, by the General Council in December.

Applications for grants, and all other communications, should be addressed to the Honorary Secretaries, at 7 Walbrook, E.C. 4.

#### METHODS AND RESULTS.

Under the active personal supervision of its Royal Presidents, the Fund has grown steadily in the scope of its work and has secured in an increasing degree the confidence and support of the public.

During the twenty-two years of its existence the Fund has distributed over £2,658,416 to London Hospitals and to Consumption Sanatoria and Convalescent Homes taking London patients, the amount distributed in 1918 being £200,000, an increase of £10,000 over the previous year, and £42,500 over the previous maximum in the years preceding the war.

The amount spent annually on administration since the foundation of the Fund has averaged £1 5s. 5d. per cent. of the receipts, which is equal to less than 3¼d. in every £1 received.

The League of Mercy, founded under Royal Charter in 1899, has enlisted the co-operation of thousands of small subscribers, and has contributed £293,000 to the Fund during the last twenty-one years; the contribution in 1919 being £17,000, £1,000 more than in 1918.

The Fund has through its Committees, and through the annual inspections by its Visitors, special facilities for ascertaining the relative needs, efficiency and economy of working of the various institutions and any special circumstances affecting their claims; and it allocates its grants accordingly. Extracts from the Visitors' Reports, together with other remarks bearing on efficiency or economy, are communicated privately to the hospitals with the grants.

All important schemes of building, extension or improvement of hospitals are submitted to the Fund and carefully scrutinised; and, in suitable cases, special grants are made. An examination is now being made of all schemes of importance deferred during the war, especially those which involve any increase in the number of beds.

In co-operation with the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds, a Uniform System of Hospital Accounts has been introduced which facilitates comparisons between the financial positions of the various Hospitals; and due economy is encouraged by the publication of an Annual Statistical Report showing the cost of working at different hospitals (see page 67). The issue of these Reports has enabled the Hospitals to effect considerable savings.

The Joint Committee of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem have this year entrusted the Fund with the distribution in London, in the early part of 1920, of surplus Red Cross Funds, in aid of schemes of improvement or extension at Hospitals which are able and willing to treat ex-sailors or ex-soldiers.

From the foregoing it will be seen that the Fund not only collects money for the voluntary hospitals but also helps to secure that all contributions given to them are efficiently and economically employed.

## PUBLICATIONS OF THE FUND.

The Fund also from time to time collects, and places at the disposal of the hospitals and the public, information on points of interest, and appoints special Committees to enquire into and report upon questions of difficulty affecting hospitals.
